

Radius is part of a \$3.3 billion industry in CA alone








Research shows that race is the primary indicator for where toxic facilities are located

Within 1 mile of Radius:

- 75% are people of color
- 43% make \$50k/year or less
- 32% are seniors and children





Radius' long history of flaunting regulations

Alameda County DA indicts Radius and two 2024 employees for 10 criminal felonies and misdemeanors, for its August 2023 fire Air District issues 3 notices of violation in response (charges subsequently dropped). to August 9 fire. CA Dept. of Toxic Substances Control issues four violations. CDTS issues a formal enforcement action against Radius/Schnitzer requiring them to clean up their act. Air District issues violation following a tin pile fire and Radius/Schnitzer's violation of a no-burn day. Radius/Schnitzer settles with the State for \$4.1 million for illegally releasing hazardous waste and harmful emissions into West Oakland. Air District issues violation for exceeding legal carbon emission limits. Air District issues violation for permit violations. Air District issues violation for running shredder 2017 Air District issues violation for a non-ferrous without abatement, resulting in illegal emissions. raw stockpile fire. CDTS issues violation for failure to minimize 2015 hazardous waste & accepting hazardous waste without a permit. Source: baaqmd.qov; echo.epa.qov


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Metal Shredding and Recycling Operations

Air Quality Issues and Concerns from Metal Recycling & Shredding

All Toxic Emissions resulting from Metal Recycling & Shredding Operations/Facilities

Particulate Matter Shredder, Pile fires,
(PM₁₀, PM_{2.5}) Material-sorting& Handling, Chemical
Stabilization, Trucks, rail, ships

Light Fibrous

Volatile Improper Depollution,

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Who Develops Air Quality Regulations?

Federal Agencies

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in the United States sets national standards for air quality, addressing issues in all fifty states, such as vehicle emissions and industrial pollution















State-Level Agency

California Air Resources Board (CARB), develops specific regulations for CA and implements federal standards.

















Local Air District

like the **Bay Area Air District**, adopt and enforce rules specific to Bay Area Region.





What other regulations are relevant besides air quality?

California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) enforces hazardous waste laws and safe disposal of contaminated resources






San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality

Develop and enforce water quality objectives, regulating surface and groundwater quality

San Francisco Bay Conservation and
Development Commission
protect and ensure the responsible, productive, and

Rule Amendment Process



What Metal Recycling & Shredding Facilities Must Follow Today?

Existing Rule

Regulation 6: Particulate Matter, Rule 4: Metal Recycling and Shredding Operations

What Does it Do?

Require facilities to develop an Emissions Minimization Plan to minimize the fugitive emissions from metal recycling facilities operating within the District



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Why are we amending the rule?

Concerns about LFM, PM, and recent fires/incidents

- Recommended Actions in Community emissions reductions plans
 - West Oakland Community Action Plan (WOCAP)
 - Richmond-North Richmond-San Pablo Path to Clean Air (PTCA)
- Evaluating challenges and opportunities of the existing Rule



Identifying the main challenges and opportunities

- White Paper (released in July 2024)
 - Thorough review and gap analysis
- Current rules that are comprehensive at other Air Districts
- Comments received from Whitepaper



Existing Rule

Facilities develop a flexible plan-"Emissions Minimization Plan", which consists strategies that shall potentially reduce emissions from their operations

Challenges

- "EMP" review process is staff time intensive
- EMP is challenging to enforce
- EMP lacks consistency between facilities



Amended Rule

The Air District establishes a consistent set of required "best management practices" that all facilities must follow

Benefits

- Introduce consistency and clarity
- Improve enforceability and accountability
- Increase stringency

- Best Management Practices to reduce fugitive emissions from point sources
- Best Management Practices for fire prevention
- Best Management Practices to reduce trackout emissions
- Registration Program
- Fenceline Monitoring



- Best Management Practices to reduce fugitive emissions from point sources
 - Require enclosures and/or windscreens for processing operations and stockpiles
 - Cease activities during high wind events
 - Use of water to minimize particulate emissions




- Best Management Practices for fire prevention
 - Shred-to-ground requirements
 - Improve depollution and inspection requirements
 - Require continuous monitoring of all fire prone storage piles with stationary FLIR
 - Use of water during operational and non-operational hours (feedstock and metal shredder residue containing flammables or materials with potential to catch fire)



Best Management Practices to reduce trackout emissions

"Track out" refers to dirt, dust, or debris that sticks to the tires of trucks and equipment and gets carried from a construction site or material facility onto nearby roads.







- Best Management Practices to reduce trackout emissions
 - Prohibition of Trackout
 - Onto paved roadways
 - From any un-paved roadways on-site
 - During cleanup activities
 - Require paving of all permanent onsite roadways
 - Facility vehicle traffic speed and signage
- ি Bay Ar Reiquirie stabilization of disturbed inactive sites

Registration Program

Require all scrap metal facilities that do not have an Air District Permit and do not operate a shredder to register with the Air District

- Promotes accountability
- Regulatory visibility
- Currently over 100 sites in the Bay Area





Air District's Potential Changes- Summary

- The current rule will be restructured
 - The EMP requirement will be removed
 - The rule will now have a list of Best Management Practices

- The changes will bring
 - Better enforceability & Accountability
 - Improved stringency
 - Greater clarity and consistency


